The Kane County MRC has a new platform to manage volunteer profiles, qualifications, interests, availability, activities, hours, and communications. The new software, Better Impact/ Volunteer Impact, is the same system that is utilized across all partners in the Northern Illinois region (Northern Illinois Public Health Consortium). We are working on setting up the system, creating accounts for all volunteers, and uploading available information from each volunteer. We are planning to launch the new system by late August or early September. For this reason, we are encouraging volunteers for a training session on how to utilize Better Impact's main features.

What we do...

KC MRC volunteers can participate in a variety of activities throughout the year, trainings and exercises, assisting our communities with public health emergency preparedness needs. We meet every second Saturday of the month, at the Health Department, to discuss current issues, projects and upcoming activities.

Notification drills

One of the key competencies that volunteer agencies have to develop, strengthen and exercise, is the ability communicate effectively in the event of an emergency happening within our jurisdiction and/or in the neighboring area. For this reason, Kane County MRC conducts monthly notification drills to make sure that we can timely and effectively reach our volunteers, and that they know how they should respond in case they are called to help during a public health emergency.

Activities, Trainings & Exercises:

Staffing the KCHD Front Desk

MRC volunteers represent a fantastic resource for public health not only during emergencies, but also in non-emergency activities. Volunteers help promoting health through education in community events and public health initiatives. Our volunteers were a great asset also by helping staff the Health Department's front desk during one week in March, answering telephone calls, and greeting and directing the public seeking for services and information.

Weather Spotter Training

The Severe Thunderstorm and Tornado Spotter Training, or Weather Spotter Training, is an initiative developed by local emergency response teams to train the lay population to recognize signs of weather conditions that may pose a threat to the population, and to know how and to whom report those observations. On April 8, the Kane County MRC participated in one of these trainings at the DuPage County Office of Homeland Security and Emergency Management.

Animal Control/General Session

On April 10, volunteers had a meeting with our furry friends from Kane County Animal Control. While meeting for our monthly general session, we had the opportunity to attend a training with KCAC supervisor, Brett Youngsteadt, the training provided volunteers with a perspective of the history of KCAC and the programs held by the organizations. Volunteers had a tour by the agency and learned about basic handling tips and animal safety topics, and principles of emergency evacuation operations involving pets and animals.

Distracted Driving Awareness Week Press Conference

KC MRC actively participated in this important initiative supported by Kane County law enforcement and by the Kane County Safety Coalition, which aimed to reduce the number of accidents and deaths caused by distracted driving by promoting a mass campaign to increase awareness to the problem. The initiative culminated with the High Visibility Enforcement Campaign, when police officers conducted an ostensive enforcement and education campaign to reduce the use of cell phones while driving. Local, state and national authorities were present, and local TV and radio channels transmitted the press conference, announcing the campaign kickoff.

Volunteers participated in the annual event, promoting the MRC, and providing safe driving education to around 300 high school students, targeting the teen population for education on distracted driving and informing about new legislation on the topic to be enforced this year.

Hepatitis A Immunization Clinic/ IDPH Summit of Hope

As the outbreak of hepatitis A continues to hit specific populations (homeless, incarcerated people, men who have sex with men, injection drug users, and people who deal with these groups routinely), the Kane County Health Department continues to invest in immunization of these vulnerable groups. On April 23, volunteers Cathy Schmitt, Jan Fulfs and Mary Ellen Goebel helped the Health Department during IDPH Summit at the Painter's Council, in Aurora.

I-HELPS Statewide Drills

In addition to our monthly notification drills with the Health Department, KC MRC participated in two additional notification exercises with the MRCs of Illinois (MRCIL) and with MRC units from the Chicago Healthcare Coalition for Preparedness (CHSCPR), both using the I-HELPS platform. Ninety and seventy five percent of the volunteers, respectively, responded to those drills.

WellBatavia Festival

Again, this year, the KC MRC participated in this fun local event, aimed to highlight features of the Batavia community, celebrating with fresh and locally produced food, engaging physical activities and a variety of programs to promote health and safety of its residents. Our volunteers helped the Health Department with a survey on Vaping and with providing education on mosquito and tick safety. We also provided education on measles and on the importance of keeping immunizations up-to-date, especially for children and older adults. As usual, we also used the opportunity to promote awareness and recruit for the MRC.

Measles Case in Kane County

By the end of May, Kane County had to face a relevant public health problem, when a resident was diagnosed with measles. Before the diagnosis, the sick individual had spent two days going to the work setting, and visiting commercial business facilities, representing exposure to hundreds of residents. The Health Department had to work around the clock to identify these people, interview them and initiate quarantine procedures and symptom follow up for those who were not immunized against measles, in a great effort to contain disease spread. Our volunteers Suzanne Rozycki and Jan Fulfs donated many hours working on calling contacts, providing information and entering data in IDPH outbreak investigation system, summing almost 20 hours worked over a weekend. It was public health emergency response at its best, showing the difference that trained volunteers can make to protect the public's health from a threat.

Can Measles Be Prevented?

Measles is a serious, highly contagious disease caused by a virus. The virus is spread easily through the air when an infected person coughs or sneezes or by direct contact with infected nose or throat secretions. There are no antiviral drugs for treating measles.

Measles can be prevented with measles vaccine. The vaccine is recommended for children at 12 months of age. This shot is given as measles, mumps, rubella (MMR) vaccine. A second shot of measles vaccine, usually MMR, is now required in Illinois for all children kindergarten through 12th grade. Anyone born after January 15, 1957, who has not had at least one dose of measles vaccine after 12 months of age or who has not had the measles should be immunized.

All persons working in health care settings should receive two doses of measles vaccine (MMR) unless they have had the disease and, therefore, are immune. **Anyone planning to travel internationally, should make sure they are protected against measles and other dangerous diseases before they go abroad.** Women should not get the vaccine if they are already pregnant or if they plan to get pregnant within three months after getting the vaccine. Acquired immunity after illness is permanent.

It is important to know your immunization status. KCHD recommends that you talk to your primary care doctor to make sure you are up to date and receive a copy of your record.

KCHD held a FREE vaccination clinic for MMR on July 18th. Future clinics are being planned. Stay tuned to the KaneHealth.com website and KCHD Facebook page for more information.
