Ten essential services of Public Health

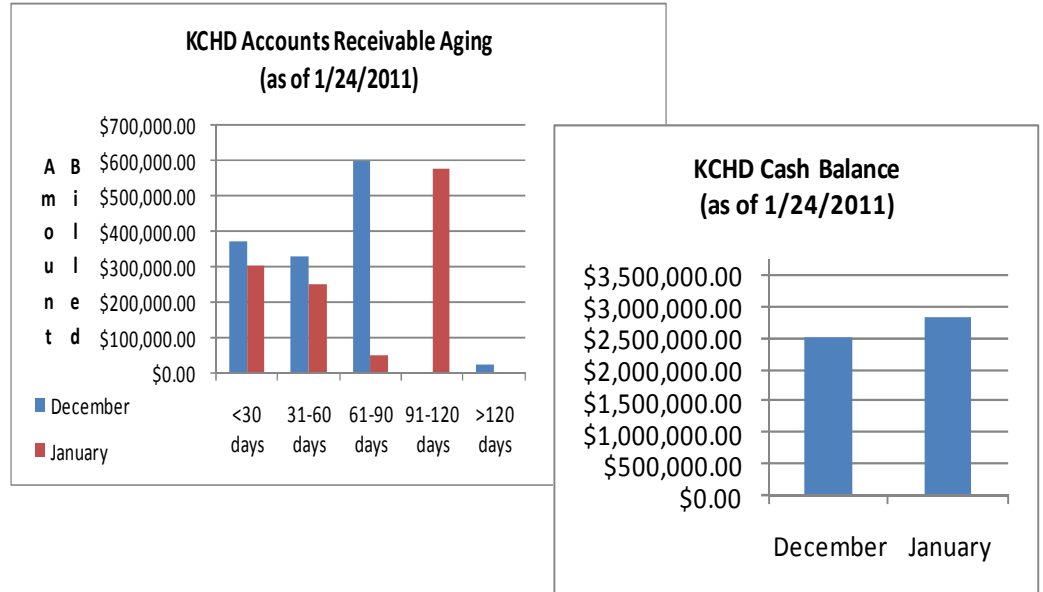
1. Monitor health status and understand health issues facing the community,

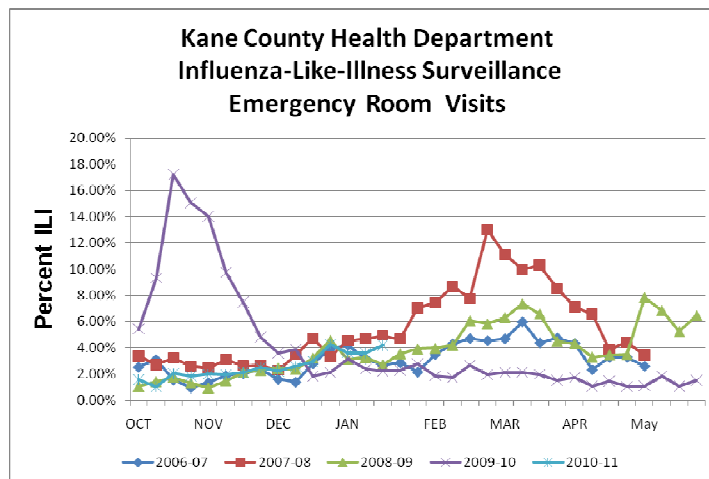

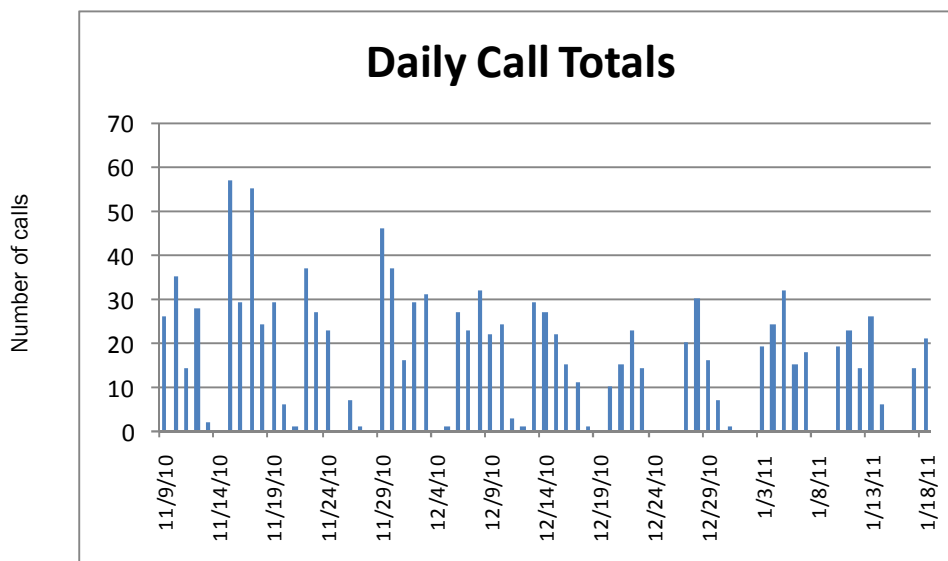
