

Weekly Influenza Surveillance Summary

Overview

Influenza surveillance for Kane County Health Department includes the collection of data from hospital emergency rooms, laboratories, and public schools. Our participants have reported the following aggregate measures:

- Among five reporting hospital emergency rooms, 10.3% of visits were for influenza-like illness (ILI).¹
- During Week 50, 4 labs reported that 121 of 956 (12.7%) specimens tested for influenza were positive.²
- The ILI absenteeism rate for public schools in Kane County was 1.9%. No public school was closed due to increased ILI activity
- As of the week ending December 17, there have been 26 influenza-related ICU admissions reported to the health department.
- To date, 2 outbreaks of influenza have been reported in Long-Term • Care/Assisted Living facilities in Kane County.

Emergency Room Visits

During Week 50, 10.3% of reported hospital emergency room visits were for influenza-like illness (ILI).¹

Each week, data for the 2022-23 season will be presented with data from the previous flu seasons to show the trend of ER visits for ILI over time.


Visits for influenza-like illness to reporting emergency rooms during Week 50 had the following age distribution:


- 0-4 years: 19.8% of all ILI visits
- 5-24 years: 33.9% of all ILI visits
- 25-64 years: 31.8% of all ILI visits
- 65+ years: 14.5% of all ILI visits

Throughout the season, KCHD will provide updated information on the total number of people visiting the emergency room for ILI, and what age groups make up those visits.







No Activity:	No laboratory-confirmed cases of influenza and no reported increase in the number of cases of ILI.
Sporadic:	Small numbers of laboratory-confirmed influenza cases or a single laboratory-confirmed influenza outbreak has been reported, but there is no increase in cases of ILI.
Local:	Outbreaks of influenza or increases in ILI cases and recent laboratory-confirmed influenza in a single region of the state.
Regional :	Outbreaks of influenza or increases in ILI and recent laboratory confirmed influenza in at least two but less

than half the regions of the state with recent laboratory evidence of influenza in those regions.

Widespread: Outbreaks of influenza or increases in ILI cases and recent laboratory-confirmed influenza in at least half the regions of the state with recent laboratory evidence of influenza in the state.
