The best way to prevent the flu is by getting your annual flu shot. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention recommend everyone over the age of six months be vaccinated. And by following the simple guidelines of the "3 C's" — Clean your hands, Cover your cough and Contain germs by staying home when you're sick — we can all help to stop of the spread of the disease.

- 5. Develop public health policies and plans


- 6. Enforce public health laws and regulations

What's in your emergency kit?

When you change your clocks back to Central Standard Time on Nov. 1, use it as a reminder to check your preparedness kit to make sure your emergency stockpile isn't missing any items and the food hasn't expired. The American Public Health Association's "Get Ready: Set Your Clocks, Check Your Stocks" campaign is reminding people to refresh their emergency supplies before a disaster occurs.
