Valentine's Day is a celebration of the heart, which is why we recognize American Heart Month during the month of February. Heart disease and stroke are the No. 1 and No. 3 leading causes of death in Kane County, and the Kane County Health Department will be emphasizing heart health throughout February. Some more statistics for Kane County:

Percent of adults who reported ever having:

- Angina or coronary heart disease 2.8%
- Stroke 1.4%

The rate of hospitalization for uncontrolled hypertension:

• 44.1 per 100,000 residents


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Measles making a comeback?

Measles is a highly contagious virus that lives in the nose and throat mucus of an infected person. It can spread to others through coughing and sneezing. Also, measles virus can live for up to two hours on a surface or in an airspace where the infected person coughed or sneezed. Measles is so contagious that if one person has it, 90% of the people close to that person who are not immune will also become infected.
