- 5. Develop public health policies and plans


- 6. Enforce public health laws and regulations

'Tis the season for West Nile Virus

Kane has recently seen its first human case of West Nile virus (WNV) in 2015. Most people (70-80%) who become infected with WNV do not develop any symptoms. However, about 1 in 5 people who are infected will develop a fever with other symptoms such as headache, body aches, joint pains, vomiting, diarrhea, or rash. Most people with this type of WNV disease recover completely, but fatigue and weakness can last for weeks or months.
